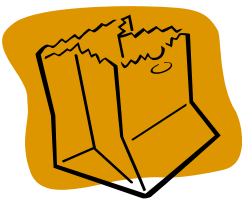
October Food Drive

Stewardship Vignettes

...or How Sacrificial Giving Has Kept Our Church Alive



The Stewardship Committee would like to encourage all of us, in considering our annual pledge, to reflect on the habits of the heart of parishioners past. Since its beginning in 1840, this parish has lived on those who have given generously in gratitude for, and realization of, God's abundance. Every month for the next year, the committee will offer a historical vignette telling of our good stewards living and dead.

And every stone shall cry... That haunting Richard Wilbur poem we sing at Christmastime seems to speak also of every quarried gray stone in the outside walls our Victorian church building. In the hymn, every stone cries in praise of the Christ child, but also for the stony hearts of men and for the **sky that shall "groan and darken."**

The load-bearing stones of R.E. Lee Memorial Church cry in praise. But also in memory of some very dark skies.

The Civil War plundered Lexington of talent and treasure. Our multi-talented rector in the 1850s, the Rev. Dr. William Nelson Pendleton, scholar, author and founder of Episcopal High School, had also been a math professor and cadet at West Point. So he left Grace Church in 1861 to serve as an officer in the Rockbridge Artillery, and eventually became a brigadier **general as the Army of Northern Virginia's chief of artillery. A man of canonical authority, he named his heaviest cannons Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.**

Families of the church suffered much. VMI cadets barely out of childhood died in mud at New Market, including one who had been confirmed by the bishop at Grace Church the week before. Both sons of parishioner Henry Norgrove died at Chancellorsville. Pendleton, now General, lost his **son Sandy at Fisher's Hill.**

Pendleton returned to his old position at the church in 1865, but this time with no salary. Here began the hard years of Reconstruction, when everybody was poor but faith kept the candles lit. Pendleton raised the roof of his rectory attic to start a school for orphans there. The church added a Sunday school for African-Americans that was so popular, it had an enrollment of more than 60 black pupils and about 10 black teachers, as large as the white enrollment.

Pendleton, whose photograph graces our Parish House gallery of former rectors, led the people of this parish in keeping the faith.

Candidates for Vestry 2011

Alexandra Brown

Alexandra Brown, a native Tennessean, came to Virginia from Columbia University and Union Theological Seminary (NYC) in 1987 to teach at Washington and Lee in the Religion Department. That initial appointment turned into a 25-year (and counting) career of teaching and administration at W&L. Her academic specialty and the field in which she contributes research and writing is Biblical Studies, specifically the writings of the Apostle Paul. In 1994, after a several years of discernment (and a lifetime as a Baptist), she was confirmed as an Episcopalian by Bishop Light at R. E. Lee Memorial Church. Over the years at R.E. Lee, she has served in the adult choir, the Vestry, various Sunday School classes and adult Bible study opportunities (some at Kendal). Most recently, she has been honored to serve on the Sudan Committee and to assist with the St. Francis Choir. If elected to the Vestry, she would hope to contribute broadly to continuing discernment and implementation of the church's mission locally and globally, investing especially in the area of education. Alexandra is mother to Sophia, age 10, who was baptized at R. E. Lee in 2002.



Five new members will be elected to the Vestry on Sunday, Oct. 10. Weather permitting, voting will take place on the Courtyard. The polling station will be open following the 8 a.m. service and will remain open until 10 minutes following the 10:30 service, reopening five minutes before the 5 p.m. service and remaining open for 10 minutes following. Confirmed communicants and adult baptized members (age 16 and older) who for three months preceding have been regular worshipers in the parish and regular contributors to its financial support are entitled to vote. Absentee ballots are available from the Parish Administrator and must be returned by Friday, Oct. 8.

Melissa Cox

While here I have served on the Habitat for Humanity Board and done pick-ups for the Re-sale Store, and have been an office and patient volunteer with Hospice for over 10 years.
