Sudanese Bishop Here for Feast of Marc Nikkel Oct. 2

On Sunday, Oct. 2, The Rt. Rev. Andudu Adam Elnail, Bishop of Kadugli Diocese in the Nuba Mountains of Sudan, will lead a forum on Sudan at 9:30 and preach at the 10:30 service. When he was consecrated in 2002, he was the youngest bishop in the Anglican communion.

Bishop Andudu was in the United States when, less than a week after South Sudan celebrated its long-awaited independence, he learned that there had been mass murder of people in his region. "Friends, brothers and sisters, children, my flock, have been killed mercilessly and are lying now in mass graves in Kadugli," Andudu told the Episcopal News Service.

Andudu's cathedral and home in Kadugli have been destroyed. It is not safe for him to return to Sudan, and he is awaiting the arrival of his family here. Join us for a first-hand account of the state of the Episcopal Church in Sudan as it struggles to preach a message of peace and reconciliation in the face of violence and death.



Vestry Elections To Be Held on Oct. 9

Five new Vestry members will be elected on Sunday, Oct. 9. Candidates for Vestry are: Erika Brooke, George Brooke, Dennis Cross, Bob Glidden, David Hansen, Mo Littlefield, and Tom Vinson.

Weather permitting, voting will take place on the Courtyard. The polling station will open following the 8 a.m. service and remain open for 15 minutes following the 10:30 service. It will reopen 10 minutes before the 5 p.m. service and remain open for 10 minutes following.

To vote in a Vestry election, you must be a confirmed communicant or adult baptized member (16 years and older), be active in the worship and life of the congregation, financially support the church, and meet the preceding qualifications for at least three months prior to the election.

Absentee ballots are available from the Parish Administrator. Completed ballots must be delivered to her by Thursday morning, October 6.

Overflowing With Thankfulness

October 2 is Pledge Sunday. We invite you to place your pledge card in the offering plate or mail it directly to the church with the envelope provided in your pledge packet. Thank you for your faithful support of our church's mission.

UTO Fall Ingathering November 6

According to Dena Lee of Amherst, the new diocesan coordinator for the United Thank Offering, the Fall Ingathering is the Sunday after All Saints Day. Her letter received in September also outlines three main goals she has set for the Diocese of Southwestern Virginia: (1) to encourage every member of every church to have and USE a blue box daily; (2) secure UTO coordinators for one-third of the parishes that do not have one; and (3) continue the good work of her predecessor Jackellen Arthur in submitting and procuring grants.

The UTO nationally funds Mission and Ministry Outreach in the Episcopal Church and has done so since its inception in 1889. Every penny collected twice a year is awarded, with nothing taken out for expenses or administrative costs. Grant applications must be received by the diocesan office by December 1, 2011. The Bishop, with the UTO grant Screening Committee, will review grant applications and will submit one application to the national office by January 15, 2012. Final grant decisions will be approved at Triennium at General Convention. Applications for 2012, subject to established criteria, will be online on October 1, 2011:

UTO blue boxes are available in the church office, and we encourage everyone to take one home. Although the objective is to increase participation in this long-cherished Episcopal tradition of daily thanksgiving for all God's blessings in our lives, the actual collection may, of course, be by households. The most expedient and convenient way to handle the coin (or bill) offerings is simply to count the contents of the boxes in the household before the day of the Ingathering, deposit the money into one's checking account, and write a check for the amount to R. E. Lee Memorial Episcopal Church, with UTO on the memo line. Offerings are then placed in a UTO envelope found in the bulletin.

It is the daily offering of prayers of thanksgiving accompanied by an offering of coin or paper money that carries out the ministry and mission of the United Thank Offering. The individual is enriched spiritually by sharing his or her thanksgiving with those in need worldwide. Thus is achieved the mission to "widen the circle of thankful people."

Finally, Dena Lee's letter points out a revealing truth about the UTO. "It does not negatively affect stewardship giving. In fact, it has a positive effect on stewardship. Thankful people are generous," she asserts. R. E. Lee Church has long been active and generous in the UTO enterprise. Every one of us has blessings to thank God for, and that includes every man, woman and child who worships here. Remember November 6 as UTO Sunday, and be sure to take home as many blue boxes as your household needs.

What is Godly Play?

I have been asked several times this past month "What is Godly Play?"

It's a Montessori-based religious education program that offers a child-honoring way of entering and experiencing the biblical story. We play with the language of God and God's people: our sacred stories, parables, liturgical actions and silence. Candidates for Vestry 2012

Erika Brooke



I am a stay-at-home mom with four children: Elise (9), Emma (6), John (4), and Philip (2). I met my wonderful husband, Merce, while he was a cadet at VMI and I was a senior at Lexington High School. We lived in Norfolk and then Chesapeake while he pursued his PhD in physics at ODU and I worked full-time. We then moved to Colorado Springs for two years for Merce to do post-doctoral research at the Air Force Academy. We're now settled in Lexington where Merce teaches physics at VMI. I grew up in Lexington (my parents are Phil and Sharon Peters) and R. E. Lee has been my home church since birth. I was baptized, confirmed, and married here. I have been a Sunday School teacher with middle school and 2nd/3rd grade and have been a VBS teacher. I have worked in the church nursery, am a Parish Life Guild team head, and was a member of the 2006 Rector Search Committee, which was quite a commitment! I also co-chaired the toy table for the annual bazaar. Merce and I have participated in the supper groups for several years and have enjoyed getting to know other families in our church. For the past two years, we have coordinated the Adopt-a-Rat program, which is a wonderful way that our parish shows hospitality. I love R.E. Lee and the strong community we have. It means a lot to me to see my children grow up in the same church I did and to know that they enjoy coming each week and feel so loved by the parishioners. George Mercer Brooke III is a life-long Episcopalian. He grew up in Lexington, where his father taught at Virginia Military Institute, and has attended R. E. Lee Memorial Church for more than 60 years. Following his graduation from VMI in 1967, he was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Marine Corps. He retired from active duty in 1994 as a colonel. Subsequently, George earned a Master of Arts degree in security studies and a Doctor of Philosophy degree in history from Georgetown University. Currently he is an adjunct professor of history at VMI. He is also a graduate of Sewanee's Education for Ministry (EFM) course (1984). George and his wife, Jane, moved back to Lexington permanently in May 2005. They are the parents of two children and have six grandchildren. George previously served on the Vestry at R. E. Lee from 2007-2009; he was junior warden in 2008 and senior warden in 2009. If elected, he plans to focus on three things: improving mutual communication between the parish leadership (both clergy and lay) and the congregation, expanding parish membership, and continuing recent capital improvements.

Dennis Cross



Dennis W. Cross was born in Bristol, Virginia and has attended R. E. Lee Episcopal since 2004 when he arrived at W&L to become the Vice President for University Advancement. In this role, Dennis oversees alumni affairs, communications and public affairs, development, law school advancement, special events, and special programs. He serves as the University's senior philanthropic officer and is general manager of W&L's \$500 million campaign. Dennis is a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Vanderbilt and has Master of Divinity and Master of Theology degrees from Harvard, with concentration in the philosophy of religion. Dennis has been involved in Episcopal churches in Nashville, TN, Chapel Hill, NC, and Williamsburg, VA. He and his family are regular worshipers and active participants in the church's programs. Dennis currently serves as a reader and as co-chair of the Gadsden Committee, where he helps coordinate, evaluate, and make outreach grants. Dennis is interested in the parish clearly articulating and planning its core missions and operations and inspiring congregational commitment to fulfill the mission and plan. Dennis also has special interests in the parish's programs in Christian education, youth, music, and worship and in the care of the parish's historic facilities. He also serves on the Board of Governors of Stuart Hall School in Staunton, a member of the Church Schools of the Diocese of Virginia.

Robert Glidden

Robert Glidden and his wife René have been members of R. E. Lee Church since 2004, when they retired to the Lexington area. Bob is a retired university professor and administrator. He holds the title of president emeritus at Ohio University, where he was president from 1994 until his retirement in 2004, and at the California Polytechnic State University, where he was interim president during 2010-11. He continues work in higher education as a private consultant, as a leadership coach, and in the area of accreditation. Bob is a trustee of the church and chair of the Finance Committee. He has previously served on the Vestry (2005-08), was senior warden in 2008, and has also been a member of the Stewardship Committee. His interest in serving on the Vestry is "simply because I love R. E. Church and want to do whatever I can to help us be a pillar church in our community."

Spotlight on Mission: The Free Clinic

The Rockbridge Area Free Clinic is a private, nonprofit organization that was founded by a group of concerned citizens in 1992. The Free Clinic exists to provide quality health care to low income, uninsured and underinsured people living in the Rockbridge area. Medical care, dental care and pharmaceutical medications are the core services offered to over 2,300 patients. In 2011, the RAFC continues to provide mental health counseling, and in May, RAFC conducted its first on-sight vision clinic as well.

Patients of the Free Clinic are often grateful for the care they receive. Many RAFC patients leave personal comments on patient satisfaction surveys:

—The Free Clinic has been a guiding light for me. The nurse practitioner should be awarded the medal of patience for putting up with me. All the staff is first rate.

—Thank you for the exhibition of God's grace here.

—Everyone is ALWAYS most helpful, kind and professional and I certainly am very grateful that I can use the many wonderful services you provide. Thanks!

—I don't have any insurance at all, and I thank God we have this place!

—I am honored to have such a world-class medical clinic in my area! It is what medical care should be.

The current economic conditions have created an unprecedented need. The Free Clinic can help the recently unemployed bridge the gap between the loss of insurance and new employment by helping them maintain prescription medication and by providing access to health care providers. A New Church Beautification Project: Join Us in Walking a Sacred Path



Starting this month we will feature a series of articles about labyrinths and why this is a positive addition for our church and the greater Lexington

community. Content is shared with us by Labyrinth Enterprises, St. Louis, MO.

What is a labyrinth?

A labyrinth is a pattern, generally two-dimensional, in which a series of lines delineate a pathway which is meant to be walked. Labyrinths are ancient, going back to pre-history and being mostly circular, labyrinths reflect the basic movement of creation. The labyrinth was modified by the Christian Church in the Middle Ages to incorporate specific Christian meaning and symbolism.

We will be using a variation of the Chartres Cathedral labyrinth here at R.E. Lee Memo-

rial Church reflecting our Christian heritage. It is important to distinguish between a labyrinth and a maze.

Labyrinth is used to identify a pattern that has a single path, which, although it may be circuitous, leads unflinching to the center without any intersections or choices to make. A maze on the other hand, involves a complex pattern with many paths, intersections, choices, and dead ends.

A maze also involves a contest, a puzzle to be solved. It requires constant mental and intellectual effort. A labyrinth requires no such effort. The mind can relax, but because the path is circuitous, one must still pay attention. That state of awareness combined with a relaxed mind, is typical of meditation. For that reason the labyrinth is frequently seen as a means for walking meditation.
