Preparing for Pledge Sunday

Every Member Canvass will be different this year. Last year, you may remember, the parish responded generously to an emergency appeal in January. Told of a shortfall that would cut our outreach ministries, including the modest salary of our part-time campus chaplain, members upped their pledges to make up for inflation and falling revenues from other sources. But correcting at the last minute for a failed Every Member Canvass is the wrong way for a church to do its work. This time, we want to avoid that by beginning early with the fellowship, theological reflection and financial understanding needed so that each of us makes our pledge in good conscience and with settled awareness.

The Stewardship Committee, bigger now and under the guidance of Howard Pickett, is doing a lot to make the budget more transparent and the gospel basis of stewardship more of a driving engine. "Overflowing with thankfulness," our theme from Colossians 2:7, is at the top of the letters you are getting from individuals on the Vestry or Stewardship Committee. Pie charts, posters, brief announcements and a couple of sermons will address both the practical and theological aspects of parish stewardship. We will also be holding about a dozen small lay-led gatherings in homes later this month (the week of Sept. 18), prior to Pledge Sunday (Oct. 2). We're calling these "Cottage Meetings." If you haven't already signed up for one, please consider doing so. These gatherings are meant for sharing ideas and feelings about the parish, as well as for hearing facts about how our money is being used for the building up of God's Kingdom.

These are hard times economically, for some more than others. But as Elijah was fed in the wilderness by ravens, so we get through hard times in the most surprising sort of ways. And when the word came to Elijah, he visited a widow in Zarephath who had little, but was able to feed Elijah and her household day after day, until the drought ended. "The jar of meal was not emptied, neither did the jug of oil fail, according to the word of the Lord that he spoke by Elijah."

We often find this strange sort of economy in our church, and in our lives, where abundance overflows from our acts of giving.

Stewardship Vignettes

...or How Sacrificial Giving Has Kept Our Church Alive

Stewardship—the Manifold Grace of God

I have been writing here, for the past year, about the good stewards who helped make this parish a generous, tough, beautiful church since it began in 1840. These figures seem heroic and amazing to me – Francis Smith, William Nelson Pendleton, Thomas Barrett, John Fletcher. Deprivations that followed the Civil War and Great Depression brought forth, through huge quiet sacrifice, our stately gothic church building, a parish house and the million-dollar Gadsden Fund. I marvel at the way this church rallied in more recent years to support Yellow Brick Road in its undercroft, the Marc Nikkel School in the Sudan and Operation Golden Rule in post-Katrina New Orleans.

Stewardship is not of buildings or programs, but of the manifold grace of God, as 1 Peter 4:10 holds. We “serve one another with whatever gift each of you has received.” These gifts reach far out into the Rockbridge community and beyond, and far forward through historic time. But I want to end this series with a personal story that I hope will express how the church’s gifts once reached deep into the Cumming family’s life, when we walked through the shadow.

When the doctor first called me with the news that Sarah’s swelling arm fracture was bone cancer, I walked from my office at W&L across campus to find Libby in her physics lab and almost wordlessly, we walked together to R.E. Lee. That was in the fall of 2005, when Sarah was 15. The next thing I remember, we were praying with Tom O’Dell in his office. The following weeks and months brought chemo, surgery, more chemo, and more surgery. Most of that time – we can’t explain how – Libby and I continued our work and life while we grew closer to one another, to God, to Sarah, and to our church family. We were in a kind of bewildered dream, but also truly alive in a new way. One thing we know, and credit, is that church members were praying for us, bringing us delicious meals, and visiting. Libby’s fellow choir members, especially.

In 2007, another blow. The bone cancer had metastasized in Sarah’s lungs. And while we were desperately researching what to do next, a CT scan came back indicating that her shoulder bone, already ravaged by surgeries, had new suspicious marks. Four days later, I got good news by phone in my office – at least as far as those suspicious marks: They were just remnants of the previous shoulder reconstruction. Again, I went to find Libby in her lab to give

her this news. The lab was dark for an experiment with lasers. As my eyes adjusted, I could see students ghosting the spaces and at one end, a table emitting beams of green light, and smoke. Libby was pumping smoke from a machine to make the light visible. This weird scene somehow signified for me our improbable little ray of hope in darkness at that point. Next came lung surgery in Atlanta, where my sister took us in, and more chemo. The next year, another blow: the chemo had triggered acute myeloid leukemia. This required a bone-marrow transplant back in Atlanta, which required more chemo, and the slow miracle of a brand new immune system growing inside Sarah.

How do we respond now to having Sarah with us still, a 20-year-old junior on the Dean’s List at Sewanee given the all-clear by her astonished doctors? We live awash in gratitude too deep for tears. How can we begin to give back whatever gifts we have received? The church – its people, prayers, hymns and sacraments – sustained us and gave us the wisdom to bear whatever unfolded. Sometimes, we couldn’t even bear the gifts, sneaking out of a church service when Hymn 400 got to the verse about praising even “you, most gentle death,” or trying to read books given to us, with all the best intentions, to prepare us for the loss of a child.

In the midst of Sarah’s ordeal in 2007, just back from lung surgery in Atlanta, she was confirmed by Bishop Powell at R.E. Lee on May 7, receiving a cross made from the heart pine of the 1882 church steeple that had just been replaced. The bishop also blessed the new steeple that day with holy water he squirted from the front patio with a Hasbro Super Soaker. I think we were all sprinkled a little from where we watched with upturned faces.

I know we all come to that sprinkling, our sense of gratitude, from different places. For me, it was the place before we knew the outcome, in the depths of Job’s bitter complaint, when God’s hand was heavy “despite my groaning.” There were no bargains struck, or sought.

More than once, moaning to a hidden God, I came to an acceptance of the stark fact that if this could be taken from me, then nothing is mine. All is His, given, taken, or given back for temporary keeping, for loving rightly. This is the root of my stewardship now, out of the depths of a dark understanding.

Spotlight on Mission: Sudan

For the past six Septembers, R. E. Lee Church has celebrated the Feast of Marc Nikkel, and often, thankfully, in company with many Sudanese from Roanoke. It was Marc Nikkel, missionary to Sudan and Episcopal priest ordained in this diocese, who taught us, through much correspondence and several visits here, about the unique form of faith of the Sudanese Church which you read about in the May and June issues of Cross and Crown.

The Sudanese homeland, frequently in the news of late, has been split in two as of July 9, but the Province of the Episcopal Church of Sudan (the ECS) is still unified and working very hard to sustain its fast growing Christian population throughout the two countries—no easy task when both Sudans are struggling to establish their new, and seemingly opposing identities.

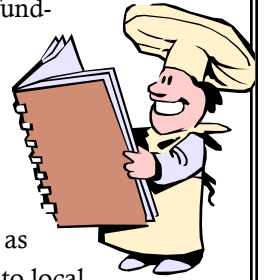
This year, with the Feast of Marc Nikkel on Sunday, October 2, we plan to remember him while at the same time focus on the whole of the ECS as it copes with the formation of two new countries. The Sudanese Bishop of Kadugli in the Nuba Mountains of Sudan, the Rt. Rev. Andudu Adam Elnail, is in the US at this time. If he accepts the invitation of Bishop Neff Powell to come to our diocese, then he, Bishop Andudu, will be a very special guest on October 2 along with our Sudanese friends from Roanoke!

The Sudan Mission Group of the parish is also planning a meal and a program by the Sudanese Children's Peace Dancers, as well as a bulletin board in the Parish House featuring the Sewing for Sudan project, biographies of our Sudanese students, the work of the Sudanese Women's Group which began in March this year, and new photos of the Marc Nikkel School. Please look for more details in future Sunday bulletins and the October Cross and Crown.

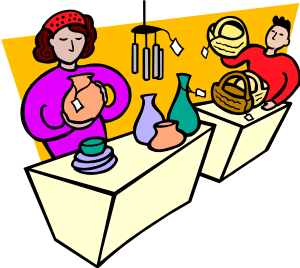
Sign Up Now for the the Plum Pudding Crew!

A New Church Beautification Project: Join Us in Walking a Sacred Path



Recently a group of parishioners have been working on an exciting project to create an outdoor sacred space that will touch the lives of

individuals, families, and students. Since Yellow Brick Road moved to its new home, the play yard behind the church and parish house has fallen into disrepair and become an eyesore. Plans are to beautify that area to include a meditation garden with a labyrinth at the center, a safe play yard for children and families, and a connecting pathway between the church and the Washington and Lee campus.

New mulch/woodchips will be spread to allow for a safe family component in the play yard area behind the parish hall. While smaller in area, the play yard will be attractive and functional and draw children and families to a pleasant and safe location.

The area behind the church will be developed into a Meditation Garden, a place to experience the sacred in an outdoor setting. In the center of the garden will be a labyrinth, an ancient pattern found in many cultures around the world.

For almost a thousand years there has been an identifiable Christian labyrinth tradition. In keeping with this tradition our labyrinth will be constructed with a flagstone path based on the design of the historic labyrinth at Chartres Cathedral in France. The labyrinth has been called a form of walking meditation, introspection, prayer, contemplation, and even stress management. It has only one path so there are no tricks and no dead ends.

The labyrinth walk represents our life pilgrimage as we journey to God at the center, listen and are replenished for our walk back out to our daily lives. Future issues of the Cross & Crown will include more informa-

tion about the history and usage of the labyrinth.

Surrounding the labyrinth will be benches for quiet prayer and contemplation as well as planted areas that will be full of Biblical herbs and plant material. This will provide a wonderful opportunity to involve the youth and the children of the parish in tending the garden and also inspire special programs and projects.

This project will be secured totally with private funding. The church budget is not impacted by this effort. In no way do we want to conflict with the vital church stewardship efforts. Without everyone's annual pledges it would be impossible to operate our church.
